### **MEETING ESSENTIAL COMMUNITY NEEDS**

#### **ACCESS TO HEALTH SERVICES**

Thanks to YOU, since January, we have provided free health services to **5,969** less-advantaged members of our community, including medical care, dental & vision services, mental health counseling, case management, community-based health screenings, COVID vaccines, and other health-supporting services. "Westminster saved me from getting full blow diabetes. I never knew that my blood sugar was so high until I met WFC's outreach team at the Latino market where I shop. Turns out I was pre diabetic without knowing it! The following week I saw a doctor at WFC. They also taught me how to check my blood glucose at home and what not to eat. My blood sugar is starting to improve and I feel better," shared one of our patients.





#### **FOOD SECURITY**

In addition, with families facing unprecedented high rates of inflation, our food security program continues to be in high demand. Just in the first six months of this year, we have already provided food assistance to more than 10,900 families, accounting for 45,954 individuals, most under the age of 18. Thanks to YOU, families have access to fresh fruits and vegetables weekly to eat well and stay healthy. As one of our patients commented, "Without Westminster, I don't know how I would put food on the table for my kids. The money I bring home from cleaning houses is barely enough to pay the rent and utilities, and the clinic has also taught me how to incorporate new healthy foods into our daily meals."





#### **HOMELESSNESS PREVENTION**

We also continue to help families who are at risk of becoming homeless because they fell behind on their rental payments due to the pandemic. Since the program started, we have helped 1,315 families stay housed. "WFC's team helped us secure funds from the state to pay the rent and utilities we owed. Now we are all caught up!" said a young mother of 3 who lost her job as a nanny in the early days of COVID.

### **TEEN PROGRAM UPDATES**

## VENTURA COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS RECOGNIZES CURRENT WFC TEENS

On July 27, the Ventura County Board of Supervisors recognized Westminster Free Clinic's **200** high school students from our two-year Healthcare Careers Pathways Program for their service to the community. Students from our Thousand Oaks and Oxnard sites were commended for their commitment and dedication to advancing health access in our county. After the award event, one of our students commented, "I am beyond grateful for this recognition. I love serving my community and what better place to do so than at WFC, where I can help people without health insurance get access to the health care they need. My dad is a patient here and that's how I found out about the program. To have the Board of Supervisors acknowledge our efforts meant everything to me!"



#### **GRADUATING SENIORS**

In June, 71 high school students who graduated from our program were accepted to college and/or advanced health training programs, including 44 students who will be the first in their families to go to college. Most graduating seniors are going into careers in healthcare including nursing, medicine, dentistry, and optometry! One of our students commented before leaving, "WFC put me on track for pre-med school. I have a long way to go, but I will be back to help next summer as a scribe."

#### **NEW STUDENTS**

In April, we enrolled and trained a cadre of 101 new high school students from across the

county in our program to replace our graduating seniors. They have already gained new skills and are doing a great job!

### PATIENT SPOTLIGHT

Carmen (only her first name is provided to protect her privacy) is a a long-time WFC diabetic patient who was past due for a mammogram. She works part-time in a local restaurant earning minimum wage. On a routine visit to WFC to pick up her diabetes medications, she learned about WFC's breast and cervical cancer prevention program (see flyer below). WFC's case manager referred Carmen for a mammogram and later on for a biopsy. The news wasn't good. She was diagnosed with breast cancer. "I became very stressed and depressed when I learned I had cancer. Not only was the diagnosis terrifying, but I didn't know how I could afford to pay for treatment," she confided. Luckily, WFC was able to enroll her in the state's Every Woman Counts Program, which covers breast and cervical cancer screenings and treatment for those without insurance. Carmen has good days and bad days, but she is still working part-time and comes to clinic regularly for food assistance and attends our virtual health education classes to keep her diabetes in check. Thanks to your support, so far in 2022 we have referred 100 low-income women for free mammograms.
